Here is some general background about the contracting out of federal libraries which may help to show why we're concerned ~~about~~ about the Ed Dept library, & support the Owen's Amendment on the House LSCA bill

STATUS OF FEDERAL LIBRARIES

The U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular No. A-76, "Performance of Commercial Activities," establishes federal policy regarding the operation of commercial activities and requires federal agencies to conduct cost comparisons to determine the most economical way to perform commercial activities--by private commercial source or in-house, using government facilities and personnel. Library services and facility operation, and cataloging are among the examples of such activities listed in the circular. Since 1984, libraries have been on an OMB list of functions targeted for A-76 review throughout the federal government. Agencies can also contract out functions with 10 or fewer employees without first conducting cost comparison studies, making libraries doubly vulnerable.

Since 1983 when the impetus to contract out commercial activities gained momentum, a number of federal libraries have been turned over to the private sector for operation. An accurate count is difficult. Members of ALA's Federal Librarians Round Table have relied on the Federal Register and Commerce Business Daily to keep tabs on commercial activity reviews, but this is often hit or miss.

As far as we know, the Office of Management and Budget does not maintain detailed information about how many of the approximately 2400 federal libraries have been contracted out. In response to an information request by Sen. Barbara Mikulski (D-MD) in 1987, OMB requested data from 23 of the largest departments and agencies which have 1,965 libraries. A total of 78 libraries were contracted out. OMB had no data on the numbers of support services contracts in which libraries have some functions provided by contract, but the management of the library remains with the government.

That several major federal libraries are run by a foreign-owned company has brought protests from Members of Congress and ALA. Aspen Systems Corporation is a subsidiary of the Wolters Samson Group of The Netherlands. The following are some of the federal libraries which have been contracted out:
