Books can be identified under the topics in the syllabus as well as under such diverse headings as Branding; Customer relations; Information technology; Internet marketing; Leadership; Organizational change; Organizational effectiveness; Public relations; Social Media; Social psychology; Web sites-Marketing; Books are selected not only through the COM allocation but also in CBA, HDF, JOR, PSY and SOC.

The current allocation for book materials in the Department is \$2080. Making the support from other URI departments and other HELIN libraries especially important.

All of the titles listed are available at URI, and almost all years are available electronically.
