Health is a multi-disciplinary department. As such, current resources exist in many relevant categories. Health does not have a specific fund allocation but rather draws on the allocations in related areas. Journal subscriptions are purchased as packages so those costs are not separated by department or college. There are hundreds of health related journal titles in the URI journal collection.

2. Does URI have the essential journals as noted in the Faculty Questionnaire?

URI has the American Journal of Public Health from 1971-2015, with new material added monthly. There are many other health related journals in the URI collections.

3. What new resources are required to support the course (including media, electronic, or other non-print materials)?

No new library resources are required to support this course.

4. What information mastery sessions will be required for the students?

No information mastery sessions are required for students. The Instruction Unit of the library is available to provide session concerning use of journal databases, selecting appropriate information, citation formats, etc. by appointment. This would be strongly recommended as students at the 100 level often have little experience in this area.
