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REPORT OF THE ACADEMIC STANDARDS COMMITTEE

Certain courses, because of the nature of the subject matter or purpose, do not lend themselves to precise rating of grading of the students (e.g., research, seminar, practice teaching, band, etc.). Close differentiation of the students in any of these courses would be difficult and relatively meaningless. The Academic Standards Committee is recommending that provision be made so that some courses may be "S/U courses". In these courses, the only grade given would be Satisfactory (S) or Unsatisfactory (U), (or P/F at the discretion of the registrar). Precedent for these grades already exists in the case of graduate research.

To qualify as an "S/U course" application would be made to the Curricular Affairs Committee by the appropriate college faculty. Approval of the Faculty Senate would then be required after recommendation by the Curricular Affairs Committee. "S/U courses" would be so labeled in the course description in the University catalog. Calculation of the students' quality point average would be the same as in the Intellectual Opportunity Plan.

Recommendation:

Revise 7.1.1 e to read:

e. <u>Satisfactory and unsatisfactory</u>. Certain courses do not lend themselves to precise grading (e.g., research, seminar). For these courses, only a grade of satisfactory or unsatisfactory shall be given to all students enrolled. To qualify as an "S/U course", the course must be approved by the Faculty Senate after recommendation by the Curricular Affairs Committee. "S/U courses" should be so labeled in the catalog. An "S/U course" is not to be counted as a course taken under the Intellectual Opportunity Plan.
