HONORS PROGRAM COMMITTEE

April 1970

1. Recommendation:

The Coordinator of the Honors Colloquium may propose, and the Honors Program Committee may put into effect, measures to limit the number of students enrolled in the Honors Colloquium. Such measures may consist of:

- exclusion from the Colloquium of Seniors not participating in the departmental or college honors thesis phase of the program;
- 2. an increase in the required minimum quality point average, for Juniors or Seniors or both.

This resolution shall apply only in the academic year 1970-71.

Supporting statement.

Colloquium enrollment took a substantial increase in the years 1968-69 and 69-70. In both years there was an initial Fall enrollment of about 80 students, and a Spring enrollment in the range 50-60. This is in contrast to earlier numbers in the range 35-45.

The committee seeks authority to limit enrollment for two reasons:

- A large group results in less face-to-face contact between student and coordination in individual and small-group meetings. Such contact is viewed by the committee, by coordinators and by a number of involved students as a valuable part of the colloquium.
- The proposed restriction includes an incentive for eligible students to undertake departmental or college honors theses or projects. For the past few years, the number of students involved in this phase of the program has been disappointingly small.
