The University of Rhode Island, University Libraries has suitable existing resources to support LSC 558 Research Methods, proposed by Prof. Yan Ma. A search of the Libraries' catalog by keyword ("social sciences and research methods" for the last ten years results in over 6,000 item entries. Adding the search term library science returns 44 entries. A search using Library of Congress Subject Headings (LCSH) (library science – research – methodology, or information science – research — methodology in the URI libraries search catalog retrieved a combined total of over 100,000 entries. Students searching for articles may use a wide variety of databases including but not limited to: Education Full Text, ERIC, Library, Information Science and Technology Abstracts with Full Text, Library Literature and Information Science Retrospective, Project Muse, JSTOR, or Science Direct depending on their track in the program and their topic in this course.

Prof. Ma has not requested any essential journals or required library materials for the course, thus no special or specific library funding is necessary for the course. Information research mastery sessions can be arranged if requested.
