PROPOSED B.A. CONCENTRATION IN LINGUISTICS

- I. Proposal for recognition of a concentration in linguistics at the University of Rhode Island
 - 1. The proposal which was submitted and approved by the Faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences in May 1975 is as follows:

"Students selecting this field of concentration must complete a minimum of 27 credit hours, including 12-15 credits from the following courses:"

Students will be expected to demonstrate as well competence in at least one language other than English equal to a completed 206 or the equivalent. This ability should be attained no later than the beginning of the seventh semester.

¹This list will of course be subject to constant revision; particularly as appropriate courses may from time to time be added in the Department of Languages or in related departments.

- 2. The objectives of this program are
 - a. to enable students who wish to do so to complete an officially recognized concentration in linguistics;

b. to provide the means whereby students specializing in related fields may (1) satisfy basic requirements and prerequisites of their field of concentration and (2) take additional related electives.

- c. to give to all interested students the opportunity of acquiring a working knowledge of the structure and evolution of human language in general.
- 3. No additional facilities are required for the implementation of this concentration.
- 4. No added financing is requested. The necessary courses already exist and the instructors who offer them are now in place (see para. 1, above). No present programs need to be restricted.
- 5. No new resources are needed to implement this proposal.
- 6. No other state institution is presently equipped or staffed to offer such a program. There is of course a linguistics program at Brown, leading to the Ph.D. For obvious reasons, however, we would not in any way be in competition with them for faculty, students or resources. This program will be staffed and populated by our own faculty and students.
- II. The proposed program should have no;difficulty in maintaining satisfactory academic standards. During the past four or five years, some students have pieced together <u>de facto</u> programs and gone on to undertake graduate work in linguistics at other institutions such as Ohio Iniversity, the University of Texas, etc. Being obliged to claim official concentrations in other fields, however, they have had to take work beyond the normal minimum requirements and/or have the blessing of indulgent advisors in other fields. We feel that recognition of a possibility which already exists and which, therefore, will add nothing to present budgets, can only be to the advantage of all concerned.
