1. Department of Geology

ADD: GEL (or ESC) 100 Environmental Geology <u>11, 3</u> Geologic processes and how they affect man: geologic hazards, earthquake impact, shoreline development, off shore oil, waste disposal, water resources, nuclear power plant siting, local issues emphasized. (Lec. 3) Boothroyd and Fisher

 b) POR 335, 336 Topics in the Literature of the Portuguese-Speaking World <u>I and II, 3 each</u>
Selected topics in the literatures of continental Portugal and the adjacent islands, Brazil, Cape Verde, Angola, Mozambique. (Lec. 3) Pre: 206, equivalent or permission of instructor. May be taken concurrently with 205 or 206 by permission of the instructor. May be repeated for credit as often as the topic changes. In alternate years, next offered 1977-78. McNab

- ADD: POR 311, 312 to Division C of College of Arts and Sciences distribution requirements.

- d) POR 104 Intermediate Portuguese II <u>1 and 11, 3</u> Continuation of 103. Readings of more difficult texts. Class discussion and reports on supplementary readings. (Lec. 3) Pre: 103, equivalent, or permission of instructor. Staff

POR 205, 206 Advanced PortugueseI and II, 3 eachPractice in speaking and writing standard Portuguese.Understanding varieties of Portuguese.Materials ofcultural, intellectual and professional interest.(Lec. 3)Pre:104, equivalent, or permission instructor.Staff

- b) SPA 103, 104 Spanish Level Two <u>I and II, 3 each</u> Reading and discussion of representative authors, grammar review, and continued practice in language skills, to broaden understanding of Hispanic culture. (<u>Lec. 3</u>) <u>Pre: 102 or equivalent</u>. Staff
- c) SPA 205, 206 Spanish Level Three <u>I and II, 3 each</u> Development and refinement of all language skills, primarily through the use of Hispanic cultural and literary models. (Lec. 3) Pre: <u>104 or equivalent</u>. Hutton

ADD: B.S. degree option in Management Information Systems within the Management Science Curriculum:

The Department of Management Science offers an option in Management Information Systems. The field of information systems is concerned with the collection, storing, processing, structuring, retrieval and reporting of information to assist managers in the operations, management and decision-making functions of an organization.
