Faculty Senate Curricular Affairs Committee One Hundred and Forty-Second Report

At the Curricular Affairs Committee's meeting of February 13, 1978, the following matters were considered and are now presented to the Faculty Senate:

SECTIONI

Curricular Matters at the 100, 200 and 300-Level Which Require Confirmation:

A. College of Home Economics

Transfer of B.S. in Home Economics Foods curriculum to the College of Resource Development as follows:

Effective June 30, 1978, students currently or previously enrolled in the Foods curriculum (520) who wish to graduate with a Bachelor of Science in Home Economics degree will be transferred to the College of Resource Development for all advisory and administrative purposes.

Upon graduation students will receive a diploma which awards them the Bachelor of Science in Home Economics degree. The approval for graduation will be considered by the College of Resource Development and its faculty.

Student petitions, except as described below, will be handled through appropriate channels in the College of Resource Development. Petitions from students who seek exceptions to the Home Economics core courses (as described in Group II, 1977-78 Undergraduate Bulletin, page 69) must have the approval of the Dean of the College of Human Science and Services and the Chairman of the Department from which the exception is being sought.

- 8. Following discussion, it was agreed to forward proposed Manual sections regarding Postdoctoral Research Fellows, under consideration by the Research Policy and Facilities Committee, to the Constitution, By-Laws and University Manual Committee.
- g. It was agreed to meet with Vice President Shay at 3:00 p.m. on March 2 to hear his presentation regarding his study of the University's image in the state.
- 10. Ms. Grubman announced that the Executive Committee would have to recommend to the Senate the names of tenured faculty members to run for election as University Ombudsman for 1978-79 and 1978-80. The members of the Executive Committee agreed to think about possible names of faculty members, and discuss potential nominees on March 1.
- 11. Ms. Grubman reported that a few Senators had received letters warning them that they had been absent from at least three Senate Meetings and, if their poor attendance continued, were in danger of having their Senate seats declared vacant.

Following discussion, Chairperson Gutchen was directed to make an announcement regarding the regulations governing attendance at Senate meetings.

 Chairperson Gutchen read a memo from Dr. Crafts, Director of Student Relations and Research regarding the nomination by March 1 of students to attend a Symposium on Government to be held in Washington, D.C.

Following discussion, Ms. Grubman was directed to call Dr. Crafts and explain that the Executive Committee was not prepared to nominate any students for the Symposium.

- 13. Following discussion, Chairperson Gutchen was directed to write a brief letter to the <u>Cigar</u> in response to the letter from Mr. Callaghan about the Senate which had appeared in the February 22 <u>Cigar</u>.
- 14. The Executive Committee discussed some of the difficulties encountered by faculty members when they need to use audio visual equipment.

It was agreed to ask the Teaching Effectiveness and Facilities Committee to study the matter. Vice Chairperson Christner agreed to draft a letter to the Teaching Effectiveness and Facilities Committee.

15. Following discussion, Chairperson Gutchen was directed to write to President Newman renewing the Executive Committee's request for a copy of the Accreditation Report.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:50 p.m.

Constitution, By-Laws, and University Manual Committee
Report
2/22/78

At its meeting on 1/26/78, the Faculty Senate voted to return the <u>Manual</u> section printed below to the C.B.U.M. Committee. This section had been presented to the Senate for information, as some editorial changes had been made by the C.B.U.M. Committee. While no explicit instructions have been given to the Committee, the discussion preceeding the motion to return the <u>Manual</u> section to Committee clearly indicated that the Committee was supposed to consider eliminating differences between <u>Manual</u> regulations on leaves for graduate studies at one quarter pay and regulations on the same matter contained in the <u>Agreement Between the R.I. Board of Regents and URI Chapter AAUP</u> (20.2).

The <u>Manual</u> section is more flexible in that it allows this type of leave also for tenured faculty members, whereas the agreement restricts it to non-tenured faculty members. The C.B.W.M. Committee does not see any compelling reason to make the <u>Manual</u> language as restrictive as that of the Contract. We are, of course, aware that in cases of conflict the provisions contained in the Agreement apply; however, in those instances where - e.g., due to protracted contract negotiations - there is no <u>AAUP-Regents Agreement</u> governing matters at the University, the more flexible <u>Manual</u> language would apply. Also, we find it desirable for future contracts to adopt the more flexible language of the <u>Manual</u>, and we are communicating this to the AAUP by providing them with a <u>copy</u> of this report.

Further, it should be noted that, if the Senate thinks that the <u>Manual</u> passage printed below should be changed in substance, it should be referred to the Senate Faculty Welfare Committee for consideration.

On the basis of the above considerations, the C.B.U.M. Committee is reporting for the information of this body that, for the time being, the following section will remain part of the <u>University Manual</u> (editorial changes underlined):

7.60.16 Leave to Pursue Graduate Studies at One-Quarter Pay. A member of the faculty who has served full-time for at least three years may be granted a leave of absence to pursue graduate study. This leave shall be granted for a period of one year at one-quarter pay with the understanding that the recipient shall, upon the termination of the leave, return to duties at the university for a period of at least one year. Application for the leave shall be made in accordance with procedures and time table specified for sabbatical leaves. Shortly after return to duty, the faculty member shall file with the deam of the faculty member's college a report of the faculty member's professional activities during the absence.
