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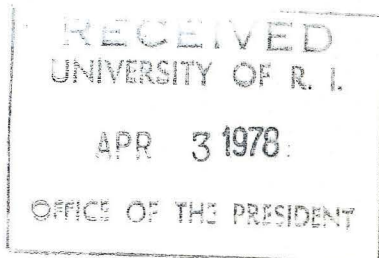


1. The attached BILL, titled One Hundred and Forty-Third Report of the Curricular Affairs Committee

MINUTES

Faculty Senate Executive Committee Meeting #26 - March 15, 1978

1. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m. in the Faculty Senate Office, Chairperson Gutchen presiding. All members were present except Ms. Grubman who was excused.
2. President Newman, Assistant Vice President Pezzullo, Dean Marks, Professor Rogers, Professor Swonger and Ms. Alexander joined the Executive Committee for discussion of the feasibility of appointing an ad hoc committee to coordinate implementation of general education objectives and mechanisms into a final proposal for consideration by the Senate.

Following discussion, the Executive Committee agreed to consult with Professor Rogers on the composition of the subcommittee of the University College and General Education Committee to consider the whole issue of general education.
3. The Executive Committee agreed to meet on Monday, March 20, 1978 at 2:30 p.m.
4. The issue was raised concerning accounting procedures relative to paying bills and its effect on the academic program. It was decided to invite Vice President Petrocelli to a meeting to discuss the Executive Committee's concerns.
5. A letter was read from the Graduate Student Association addressed to the Chairperson of the Board of Regents concerning the inadequacy of budgetary allocation for the library for staff and collection acquisitions.
6. Drafts of letters addressed to Professor Lott of the Teaching Effectiveness and Facilities Committee and President Newman, respectively, were reviewed and approved for sending.
7. The committee decided to invite Vice President Ferrante to discuss the advisability of reviewing University College before a new dean is appointed.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:15 p.m.

Department of Languages

ADD: IRE 391X, 392X Irish Literature in Translation (1,11,3)
Reading and analysis of Irish Gaelic literature in translation. Early poetry and prose sagas in the first semester; bardic poetry through the Gaelic Revival in the second. (Lec. 3) G. McNab

B. College of Business Administration

Department of Business Education and Office Administration

CHANGE: Description for BED 427:

BED 427 Organization, Administration and Methods of Teaching Distributive Education (1,3) Background, objectives, coordination and teaching techniques, administrative policies and operation of programs in secondary and post-secondary schools and adult education programs. Planning of curriculums. (Individualized Study) Pre: Permission of department. Not for graduate program credit. Staff

C. College of Pharmacy

Department of Pharmacy Administration

ADD: PAD 433X Clinical Pharmacy Consultation (1,2)
Developing pharmacy students' ability to interact effectively with patients and other providers. Content areas include patient interviewing, drug history work-ups, discharge counseling and techniques to improve compliance with therapeutic regimens. Not for graduate credit. (Lec. 2) Pre: Fourth year standing in pharmacy or permission of instructor. F. R. Curtiss

D. College of Resource Development

1. Department of Food Science and Technology, Nutrition and Dietetics

CHANGE: Codes from FNS and FST to FSN for all 100, 200, and 300-level courses (FNS 101, 150, 207, 221, 237, 331, 333, 334, 335, 347, 378; FST 378).

2. Department of Forest and Wildlife Management

CHANGE: Prerequisites for the following courses:

SECTION II

Curricular Matters Which Require Confirmation by the Faculty Senate:

A. College of Arts and Sciences

1. Department of History

ADD: HIS 363 American Urban History (1,3) Origins, development and role of cities in America from colonial times to the present. Emphasis on tensions between social change and social control generated by urban growth. (Lec. 3) Klein

2. Department of Philosophy

ADD: The following new courses:

- a. PHL 117 Social Philosophy (1 or 11,3) A systematic introduction to the philosophical problems about contemporary social relations: models of community, sources of alienation, property and ownership, the meaning of work and technology, human rights and freedom. (Lec. 3) Johnson or Staff
- b. PHL 319 Philosophy of History (1,3) Examination of central philosophical problems raised by the discipline of history: truth and fact in history, historical explanation and understanding, permanence and change in social time. (Lec. 3) Johnson or Staff

3. College of Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee

- a. Effective July 1, 1978, responsibility for the B.S. degree program in Physical Education shall be transferred from the College of Arts and Sciences to the College of Human Science and Services.
- b. Effective July 1, 1978, the College of Human Science and Services shall be authorized to approve B.A. degree candidates whose concentrations are Elementary Education or Secondary Education, provided that these degree candidates have entered the University no later than September 30, 1978.

In as much as the B.A. concentrations in Elementary Education and Secondary Education remain part of the B.A. curriculum of the College of Arts and Sciences, students will be permitted to elect concentrations in Elementary Education or Secondary Education as part of a double concentration program within the B.A. curriculum.

(NOTE: According to section 8.48.17 of the University Manual, a student who wishes to receive two bachelor's degrees from URI must satisfy the program requirements for each degree and must complete "an additional 30 hours of credit beyond the minimum requirements for the additional degree" On the other hand, section 8.48.18 allows that "Any student who has met the requirements for two separate concentrations within any single bachelor's curriculum has earned a double major and may have both fields listed on his permanent record.")

B. College of Business Administration

1. Department of Business Education and Office Administration

CHANGE: Curriculum requirements for B.S. in Office Administration by substituting liberal electives for the free electives in the second semester freshman year and first semester senior year and for the professional elective in the first semester junior year.

2. Department of Finance and Insurance

- a. ADD: FIN 396 Financial Institutions & Markets (1 and 11,3)
Comprehensive analysis of financial institutions and the markets in which they operate. The internal operations of the institutions as well as their impact on money and capital markets are examined. (Lec. 3)
Pre: ECN 125 and 126, ACC 202 and HGS 202. Staff

- b. DELETE: FIN 332 Financial Institutions (1,3)

- c. CHANGE: Curriculum requirements for B.S. in Finance

1. Department of Geology

ADD: GEL 220X Rocks and Minerals (S,3) Identification of rocks and minerals. Physical properties, crystallography, gemstones, rock classification, petrogenesis, and geologic significance. Emphasis on laboratory study and local field trips. (Lec. 2, Lab. 2) Pre: GEL (ESC) 100, 103, or 105 recommended. Hermes

2. Department of History

ADD: HIS 107X History and the Self (1 or 11,1) The use of history as a tool to gain personal insight, and personal insight as a tool to understand history. Roughton
