REPORT OF THE AD HOC COMMITTEE ON VOTING RIGHTS

August 15, 1978

. Background Information

When the creation of the College of Human Science and Services was approved by the Faculty Senate in May, 1977, questions were raised regarding the voting rights of persons who held various academic positions in the departments within the new college. In the Fall of 1977, a small committee comprising the Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Chairperson of the Faculty Senate and the Coordinator of the College of Human Spience and Services was formed to determine the voting rights of persons assigned to the new college. In order to resolve the questions on a university-wide basis, the Faculty Senate, upon recommendation of the Constitution, by-Laws and University Manual Committee, created the Ad Hoc Committee on Voting Rights in December, 1977. The Ad Hoc Committee on Voting Rights was charged with reviewing existing practices and proposing recommendations to the Faculty Senate at the first meeting in the Fall, 1978.

The Ad Hoc Committee met during the spring/semester, 1978, distributed a questionnaire to all college deans and department chairpersons, and as a result of the information received and of the committees' deliberations, proposes four changes to the University/Manual.

The following assumptions were agreed upon by the committee during its deliberations and are the basis for the committee's recommendations:

- Participation in staff, department, and/or college affairs by means of oral and written comments should be encouraged for all professional faculty.
- b. The nature and extent of commitment by certain non-continuing faculty may be such that voting hights pertaining to academic programs would be ill-advised for such persons.
- c. The decision on whether or not voting rights be extended should not be left erbitrarily to departments and colleges.

II. Recommendations

- Add the following new section 4.50.13 under Collège Faculties (4.50.10-12):
 - 4.50./3 Voting on matters which require approval by the Faculty Senate shall be limited to continuing faculty holding any of the ranks listed in 7.10.10.
- Add the following new section 4.60.12 under Department Faculties (4.60.10-11):
 - 4.60.12 Voting on matters which require approval of the Faculty Senate shall be limited to continuing faculty holding any of the ranks listed in 7.10.10.

c. Change section 4.11.10 as follows (change is underlined):

4.11.10 Membership in the University Faculty, also referred to as the General Faculty, shall be based on appointment by the President and on direct participation in or supervision of any of the following activities: teaching, librarianship and research, within the University. The General Faculty shall consist of continuing professors, associate professors, assistant professors, instructors (C.F. 7.10.10); the President, the Vice President for Academic Affairs, the academic dean(s) of each college or school, the Dean, University Libraries, and the Dean of University Extension.

d. Change section 4.11.11 as follows (change is underlined):

4.11.11 Any person who has had faculty status and who is transferred in the University to a position or office which in itself does not carry such status shall retain faculty status so long as that person is employed by the University. However, that person shall not have rank, voting privileges in department or college meetings on matters requiring Faculty Senate approval, tenure (unless earned before the transfer), or the right of salary increment as defined for academic rank.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS AND CALENDAR COMMITTEE REPORT #77-78-7

May 3, 1978

BACKGROUND:

University Manual Paragraph 8.12.12 requires that an instructor symmit a letter grade, an incomplete, an S or U for each student who is properly registered in a course at the end of the semester. The requirement is not always followed. Each semester the Registrar receives grade cards with no grade report whatsoever. As a matter of practice, the Registrar is already using the designation "NR" (NOT REPORTED) in such cases. There are, however, two problems associated with this. In the first place, the practice is not formally authorized by inclusion in the Manual. In the second place, although this "NR" should be only a temporary designation, there is no clear policy for removing them from the permanent record. The recommendation below addresses both of these problems.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Academic Standards and Calendar Committee recommends that existing <u>University Manual</u> paragraph 8.12.12 be replaced by proposed paragraph 8.12.12 as indicated below:

Existing 8.12.12

8.12.12 The Registrar shall issue to the instructor a grade card for every properly registered student in every section. The instructor shall submit to the Registrar on each grade card thus issued a letter grade, an Incomplete, or an S/U if applicable.

Proposed 8.12.12

8.12.12 The Registrar shall issue to the instructor a grade card for every properly registered student in every section. The instructor shall submit to the Registrar on each grade card thus issued a letter grade, an Incomplete, or an S or U if applicable. If the instructor does not submit a letter grade, an Incomplete, an S or U, the Registrar shall be authorized to use the designation NR (NOT REPORTED) on end-of-semester grade reports and as a temporary entry on the permanent recard. Courses receiving the designation NR shall not be included in the computation of the student's quality point average. Each NR entered on the permanent academic record either shall be reconciled to a grade within one year of the date of entry or, if it is ascertained that the student was not in fact properly encolled, shall together with the course name, be stricken from the student's permanent academic record. Any NR entry not reconciled or stricken within one year from date of entry shall be automatically converted by the Registrar to an F.
