FIN 642 Financial System and Markets I,II,3 An analysis of the effects of the financial system on individual financial markets. Emphasis placed on examination of the behavior of money, stock, bond, and mortgage markets. Pre: Permission of the instructor. All MBA foundation courses. (Lec 3) Staff

2. Department of Accounting a. Add (New)

ACC 643 Federal Taxes and Business Decisions
The course focuses on tax law and its effect on business decisions.
Cases are employed and primary emphasis is on income tax planning although estate and gift taxes are explored. Pre: ACC 510.

The M.S. comprehensive examination serves as the written portion of the department's Ph.D. qualifying examination. This is followed by oral qualifying examination, which is required of all candidates.

A survey of topics in sensation, psychophysics, perception,
memory and attention with an emphasis on how important issues
have been formulated, and the relation of these issues to

PSY 606 Social Psychology I,3
Intensive exploration of the methods, theory and data base of contemporary social psychology focusing on salient issues that clarify significant topics in this area. (Lec 3) Pre: Permission of department. Lott. A.

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PSY 640: Personality Dynamics I (Advanced Personality) - number, title, and description changed to-

PSY 605 Personality I or II,3 Reading of primary source materials from major personality theorists relevant to a particular topical emphasis. Application and comparative evaluation of the theories studies. (Lec 3) Pre: Permission of department. Stevensen and Staff

PSY 691 Individual Practicum in Teaching Psychology - renumbering the seminar and practicum components currently available to students under the PSY 6 course designation - to:

PSY 695 Seminar: Teaching Psychology II,3
