Department of Management Science

CHANGE: Prerequisite for the following courses:

- 1) MGS 445 Managerial Applications of Stimulation 1,3
 Prerequisite: MGS 202 or permission of instructor.
- 2) MGS 458 Advanced Production Management II,3
 Prerequisite: MGS 301 or permission of instructor.
- B. College of Home Economics

Department of Food and Nutritional Science

- a. CHANGE: Description for the following courses:
 - I and II, 3
 Managing human and material resources in planning and
 serving nutritious attractive meals at different socioeconomic levels. Consumer awareness and analysis of the
 factors affecting selection of food for the home. (Lec. 2
 Lab. 3) Prerequisite: FNS 101. Staff.
 - 2) FNS 333 Quantity Food Production I, II, 3
 Application, analysis and evaluation of producing, distributing and serving quality food in quantity. Experience
 in a food service facility. (Lec. 1, Lab. 4) Prerequisite:
 FNS 101, and junior standing or permission of department.
 Goshdigian.
- b. CHANGE: Description and prerequisites for the following courses:
 - 1) FNS 438 Experimental Food Science II, 3
 Principles and instrumentation techniques of basic and applied food research. Investigation of special food problems. Writing and evaluation of technical reports on research findings. (Lec. 1, Lab. 6) Prerequisite: CHM 124 or permission of department. Constantinides.

B. b. 2) FNS 441 Advanced Human Nutrition I, 3
Comprehensive study of principles of nutrition. Physiological and metabolic processes and interrelationships involving nutrients. Factors affecting nutritional health status and requirements during the life span. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: FNS 207, CHM 124, Z00 242, BCH 311 or permission of department. Dymsza.

C. College of Nursing

- 1. CHANGE: Description of the following courses:
 - a. NUR 101 Introduction to Nursing I and II, 2 Concepts of health delivery, helping relationships, stress, therapeutic communication and needs of man. Discusses the nurse's role in helping individuals obtain high level wellness and adapt to environmental changes. Emphasis on selfawareness and the use of self as a professional tool. (Lec. 1, Rec. 1).
 - b. NUR 211 Nursing in Contemporary Society I and II,3
 Trends and issues in professional practice and education and
 their relationship to the social order. Historical and philosophical foundation of nursing. (Lec. 3) Open only to registered nurse students. Houston.
 - c. NUR 220 Fundamentals of Nursing I and II,4
 Basic course utilizing beginning concepts of nursing with
 clients who have simple health problems requiring application
 of the nursing process; includes learning experiences in manual and psychosocial skills. (Lec. 2, Lab. 8) Prerequisite:
 Nursing 101 and foundation courses in physical and social
 sciences as listed in curriculum section. M. Smith and staff.
 - d. NUR 320 Public Health and Public Health Nursing I and II,7 Correlated theory and practice of basic principles of public health and public health nursing. Supervised field instruction in community agencies helps the student develop skills in giving health services to individuals, families, and groups. Required: use of automobile or meet costs for public transportation. Prerequisite: NUR 301 and 302. Staff.
- 2. CHANGE: Prerequisite for NUR 231

NUR 231 Care of the Adult I I and II,6
Prerequisite: all foundation courses in physical and social sciences
as listed in curriculum and Nursing 220 or R.N. status.

- CHANGE: Title and description for the following courses:
 - a. NUR 301 Parent and Child Health Nursing I and II,7
 Family-centered health concepts during the childbearing and childrearing phases of development. The role of the nurse in assisting
 families to adapt and function during health and illness. (Lec.7)
 Prerequisite: CDF 200 or PSY 232; PHC 226 and NUR 231, 232. Must
 be taken concurrently with NUR 302. Cumberland and staff.

- C. 3. b. NUR 302 Parent and Child Health Nursing Practicum I and II,4
 Application of family-centered health concepts to parent and
 child nursing care in selected community agencies. (Lab. 12)
 Must be taken concurrently with NUR 301. S/U credit. Cumberland
 and staff.
- D. College of Pharmacy

Department of Pharmacy

- a. CHANGE: Description of the following courses:
 - PHC 225 (or PCL 225) Pharmaceutical Calculations and Introduction to Pharmacology I, 2 Introduction to drugs, mechanisms of action, and mathematical concepts of dosage and strength. (Lec. 2) For students in the College of Nursing. Lausier and De Feo.
 - 2) PHC 383, 384 Pharmacy Practicum I and II, 3 each Problems in preparing and dispensing pharmaceuticals with an emphasis on prescription specialties, drug information, patient orientation, and State and Federal drug laws. (Lec. 2, Lab. 4) Prerequisite: PHC 353. Lausier and Elias.
- b. CHANGE: Prerequisite for the following courses:
 - 1) PHC 351 Personal Cosmetics I and II, 3 Prerequisite: PHC 344.
 - 2) PHC 353 Physical Pharmacy I, 3 Prerequisite: PHC 333.
 - 3) PHC 360 Hospital Pharmacy Prerequisite: fourth-year standing.

Curricular matters submitted to the Faculty Senate for confirmation:

A. College of Arts and Sciences

Department of History

The Curricular Affairs Committee recommends:

that the Senate rescind the action of the Curricular Affairs Committee on May 4, 1973 (Eighty-first Report of the Curricular Affairs Committee) requiring that subtitles for HIS 103 and 143 be included in the <u>Catalog</u>; and that these courses (HIS 103 and 143) be subject to the procedures required by the Curricular Affairs Committee for open-ended courses (see section 8.43.12 of the University Manual).

RATIONALE: The restrictions on HIS 103 and 143 were contradictory to the procedures for other open-ended courses according to the <u>University Manual</u>, section <u>8.43.12</u>.

ADD: ACC 415 Accounting-Computer Systems II, 3
The study of accounting information systems and the use of the computer for decision making; emphasis on sources of information and employment of analytical tools in solving accounting problems. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: ACC 312, 321, MGS 364 or permission of instructor. Brandon.

2. Department of Management Science

DELETE: MGS 445 as a requirement for students majoring in the POM area.

C. College of Home Economics

Department of Food and Nutritional Science

a. CHANGE: When offered, clock hours, prerequisite and description for FNS 331.

FNS 331 Advanced Food Study I, and II, 3 Study of food systems. Physical and Chemical changes occurring in food during preparation, serving and storage. Laboratory application including assessment of food quality. (Lec. 1, Lab 6) Prerequisite: FNS 101, CHM 124 or permission of instructor. Bacon.

b. CHANGE: When offered, department listing, title, clock hours, description and prerequisite for FNS 335 (FDS 335).

> FNS 335(FDS 335) Food Service Management I or II, 3 Administrative responsibilities in organizing, planning, analyzing, controlling and evaluating technical operations of sub-units in relation to the whole in food service systems. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: FNS 101 and junior standing or permission of department. Goshdigian.

c. CHANGE: Course number and department listing, title, clock hours, description and prerequisite for FNS 334 (FDS 336)

FNS 334(FDS 336) Quantity Food Purchasing and Cost Control I or II, 3
Production, distribution, storage, cost analysis of food supplies to serve as basis for institutional purchasing by specification. Investigation and analysis of existing purchasing systems. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite or concurrent: FNS 333 and junior standing or permission of department. Goshdigian.

d. CHANGE: Course number and level, description and delete prerequisite for FNS 237 (337).

FNS 237 (337) Introductory Food Science 1, 3
Survey of basic principles of food science and technology. New foods and technology of food products. Food utilization in well-fed and under-fed countries. Current world food issues. (Lec. 3) Constantinides.

C. e. CHANGE: Title, clock hours and description for FNS 444.

FNS 444 Nutrition and Disease II, 3
Effect of disease on metabolism and nutritional requirements, implications for dietary change and factors affecting acceptance of such change. (Lec. 2, Lab 3)
Prerequisite: FNS 441 or permission of department. Caldwell.

f. CHANGE: Clock hours, credits and description for FNS 445.

FNS 445 Readings and Reports in Nutrition II, 3 Survey of literature and available resource materials. Written reports and discussion of scientific, social, regulatory and political developments affecting nutritional status and health (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: FNS 441 or permission of department. Dymsza.

D. College of Pharmacy

1. CHANGE: Credits, clock hours and description for PHC 499.

PHC 499 Clinical Practicum II, 3-12
Faculty supervised practical experience involving selected community and hospital pharmacies and health care delivery agencies which provide patient-oriented pharmaceutical services. (Lab. 6-24) Prerequisite: PHC 451 or permission of department. Not for graduate degree program credit. Cooper and Fish.

FACULTY SENATE

The Constitution, By-Laws and University Manual Committee has submitted two proposed amendments to the By-Laws of the Faculty Senate for Consideration by the Senate at its meeting of March 28, 1974.

Final action cannot be taken on either amendment during the meeting at which it is introduced.

- 1. Proposed revised Section 1.2 of the By-Laws of the Faculty Sepate:
 - A. Present section 1.2

1.2 The Chairman shall declare the place of an elected senator vacant when he or she has been absent from five regular meetings in one academic year, provided that he or she is not ill or on official leave.

B. Proposed section 1.2

Changes are underlined.

- 1.2 The Chairman shall declare the place of an elected senator vacant when he or she has been absent from five regular meetings in one academic year, provided that he or she is not ill. Vacancies shall be filled as provided in 2.9.
- 11. Proposed new section 6.3 of the By-Laws of the Faculty Senate.

Add new:

6.3 The Chairman of the Senate with the advice of the Executive Committee and the consent of the Senate shall recommend faculty members for appointment to those University Standing Committees, Councils, and Boards, for which faculty representation is stipulated in the University Manual. The Senate's action shall be limited to consenting to the appointees for each committee or to referring the matter back to the Chairman and the Executive Committee.

The Senate shall elect faculty members to represent the General Faculty, when requested to do so by appropriate authorities. The Executive Committee shall present two nominations for each position to be filled by election. At the meeting at which an election is conducted, nominations from the floor shall be in order.
