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The Library Impact Statement for ECN 399 *Nonviolent Economics* indicates that students will not be conducting library research in the course and that there are no critical journals, monographs, or electronic resources that the University Libraries must have in order to support the course.

The syllabus for ECN 399 *Nonviolent Economics* states that required readings will be from a course packet and four books, three of which the Libraries do not currently own. I have ordered e-book versions of those three books so that they will be available to students who do not wish to purchase print copies. The syllabus also mentions a “Life Is Interdisciplinary” Final Exam, which requires that students complete a “policy analysis of a contemporary pressing issue.” Students may benefit from using library resources to research the issues they choose for this assignment. I am confident that the Libraries’ current collection is adequate for this purpose.

Based on the information above, I conclude that the University Libraries can meet the needs of ECN 399 *Nonviolent Economics* with no additional resources. In my role as Subject Selector for the Department of Economics, I support the addition of this course without reservation.
