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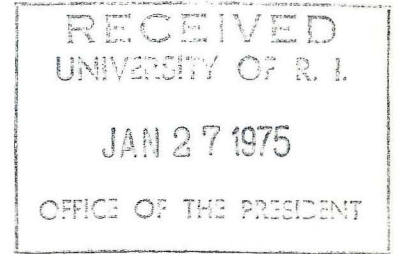

Curricular Matters Submitted to the Faculty Senate for Confirmation:

A. College of Arts and Sciences

Department of Mathematics

- ADD: 1) MTH 143 Computer Laboratory in Calculus I and II, I  
Illustration of some concepts of elementary calculus using computer, use of computer in some applications of calculus. Students will write simple programs. No previous computer or programming experience required. (Lab. 2) Prerequisite: PRIOR OR  
Concurrent registration in MTH 141. Staff
- 2) MTH 217 Computer Laboratory in Linear Algebra I and II, I  
Illustration of some concepts of linear algebra using computer, use of computer in some applications of linear algebra. Students will do programming. No previous computer or programming experience required. (Lab. 2) Prerequisite: PRIOR OR  
Concurrent registration in MTH 215. Staff

## B. Project 70

ADD: PRJ 201 Project 70 Studies

11, 3

An open-ended course to be designed each year by the students and Steering Committee of Project 70. Priority in registration is given to Project 70 students. No prerequisite. May be repeated for credit as often as the topic changes.

Procedures for approval and reporting of PRJ 201:

(Meant to conform with the spirit of Section 8.43.12-13 of the University Manual)

In the fall of each year, the students of Project 70 will elect a special committee of students to help design the course. The student committee will work with the Hall Director and the Project 70 Steering Committee\* (or designated members of the Steering Committee). Initiative for designing the course will be left in the hands of the students, but formal approval of the course will be made by the Project 70 Steering Committee. Among the decisions to be made each year are the following:

- 1) What aims will the course have: A cross-disciplinary topic, a specific skill, a traditional course with special emphasis, etc.,?
- 2) Who will teach the course: e.g. a specific faculty member, a group of faculty, students, chaplains, administrators, or a combination of several of the above? A specific faculty member will be responsible for the course.
- 3) What format will be used in the course and how many students will be allowed to enroll?
- 4) What materials will be used (books, films, etc.)?

After it has approved the course, the Project 70 Steering Committee will send information about the course to the Vice President for Academic Affairs and to the Curricular Affairs Committee. After the completion of the course, a report will be sent to the Vice President and the Committee.

- \* The Project 70 Steering Committee is composed of the following members: the Student Coordinator, one student representative from each of the eight corridors in Gorham Hall, the Hall Director, the Dean of the Students and four to eight faculty members. The Steering Committee elects its own chairman each year and meets at least once a month during the academic year.

This approval is given for the academic years 1975-76 and 1976-77, at the end of which, the course shall be reviewed and approval must be sought again.

Informational Changes (Including Experimental Courses):

College of Arts and Sciences:

a. Department of Computer Science and Experimental Statistics

CHANGE: Prerequisite for CSC 411 to CSC 311 or equivalent.

b. Department of Political Science

PSC 444X (343X) Revolutions and Revolutionary Thought 11, 3  
An historical analysis of revolutions and revolutionary movements from Jewish millenarianism to Latin American and Asian Communism. Special emphasis will be placed on the political theories which inspired and justified the revolutionary movements. Prerequisite: None, but PSC 341 and/or 342 are suggested. (Lec. 3) Rothstein

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
