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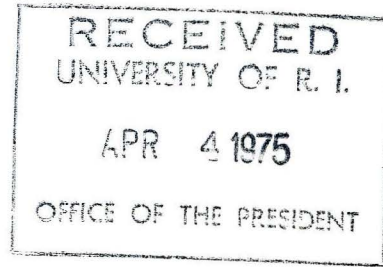

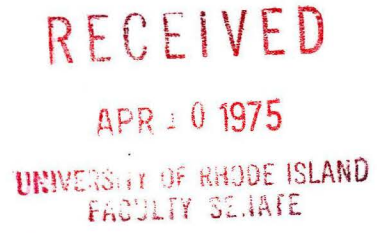

Faculty Senate Curricular Affairs Committee Ninety-Sixth Report

At its meeting of February 20, 1975 the Faculty Senate Curricular Affairs Committee considered the following matters now submitted to the Faculty Senate.

SECTION I

Informational Changes (Including Experimental Courses):

A. College of Arts and Sciences

1. Department of Education

- a. EDC 278X Career Development and Your Work Life II, 1
Designed to assist students in examining their own skills, talents and career potential and explore several career possibilities. Includes lectures, workshops, video taping for self-awareness, one individual research project.
Drum and Gilmore
- b. EDC 398X University Year for Action Colloquium I and II, 3 each
Seminar focusing on examination and integration of theoretical principles related to field experience of University Year for Action (UYA) participants. Prerequisite: Concurrent registration in EDC 399X. Required for and open only to students admitted into University Year for Action. A maximum of 2 semesters may be taken. Staff
- c. EDC 399X Practicum Experience I and II, 3-6 each
(also offered as ECN 399X, PSC 399X, PSY 399X and SOC 399X.)
Participation in experimental learning project under supervision of an academic advisor, agency supervisor, and UYA staff. Prerequisite: Concurrent registration in EDC 398X. Required for and open only to students admitted into UYA. A maximum of 6 credits may be taken each semester. Staff

2. Department of Languages

a. French

FRN 360X (or ENG 360X) Sex Role Conflict in 19th and 20th Century British, American and French Literature

II, 3

An analysis of the relationship between men and women in British, American and French literature of the 19th and 20th centuries. (Lec. 3) Not open to students with prior or concurrent registration in English 360X. Not for concentration credit in French. Benson, K. Stein

products, and rationale for their use. Lausier, Lyon

Linguistics

ADD: LIN 302 Principles of Morphology 11, 3
A thorough survey of the general principles of linguistic morphology. Extensive practical exercises. (Lec. 3) Prerequisite: LIN 202. Porter

6. Department of Physics

a. CHANGE: Description of B.S. Curriculum on p. 60 (1974-75 Undergraduate Bulletin) to read:

This curriculum provides a general background in theoretical and practical physics, and it qualifies the student for industrial research or advanced training in the industrial laboratories and in the technical bureaus of the government. Students also will have an adequate foundation for graduate work leading to higher degrees in physics.

Initiative, independent solution of laboratory problems, and research are encouraged in the advanced laboratory courses.

The following courses will usually be required for the B.S., but exceptions and /or substitutions are possible, and may be arranged upon consultation with the department. For example, a well prepared student may enroll for physics courses in the first semester of the freshman year; or courses in a related discipline may be taken instead of physics courses.

The remaining 18 credits should be selected by the student only after close consultation with his or her advisor, particularly if he or she is considering graduate study in psychology.

Student will work on a major design or other engineering project under supervision of engineers from industry and URI faculty. Prerequisite: ELE 495 and permission of department.
