SPE 471 Internship in Speech Communication I or II, 3 Course provides the student with direct supervised participation in a variety of speech communication situations and occupations. (Lec 1, Lab 4) Prerequisite: 18 credits in speech and Departmental approval. Staff

(Lab 3-9 Prerequisite: Permission of the advisor Staff

SPE 568 Clinical Practicum in Audiology I and II,1-3 each Supervised clinical practicum concerned with audiological assessment of hearing disorders and auditory rehabilitation with the hearing impaired. Practicum held on campus and within institutional and school setting. (Lab 3-9) Prerequisite: Permission of the adviser. Staff
