REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

October 5, 1982

On September 9, 1982, the Faculty Senate approved, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee, a document titled "Policies and Procedures Governing International Exchange Programs for Undergraduate Students" which appeared on pages 27-29 of the Agenda for Faculty Senate Meeting #1. This legislation was forwarded to President Newman as Faculty Senate Bill #82-83--1.

On September 28, 1982, following discussion with the Faculty Senate Executive Committee, President Newman disapproved Bill #82-83--1 because "most of the policy document addresses issues which are not under the puriew of the Faculty Senate" but stated that he was "prepared to act favorably" on legislation which relates "specifically to the Senate's responsibility for academic programs."

In accordance with section 10.3 of the By-Laws of the Faculty Senate, the Executive Committee recommends that the Faculty Senate rescind Senate Bill #82-83-1 and approve the following two academic policies from the document titled "Policies and Procedures Governing Exchange Programs for Undergraduate Students":

 Selection of URI students to participate in all exchange programs shall be the responsibility of the Study Abroad Adviser in consultation with faculty and department chairs, when relevant. Selection will be based on the following criteria:

QPA
Language proficiency when applicable
Recommendation of advisor, dean, and/or faculty
Interview
Written statement of plans and goals for the period of exchange

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

October 12, 1982

On October 7, 1982, Chairperson Findlay delivered a State of the Faculty Senate address in which he called for suggestions from the Senate and the entire University community for making URI more academically distinctive. In order to provide for a mechanism to review the suggestions, the Executive Committee recommends the creation of an ad hoc committee as follows:

The ad hoc screening committee shall solicit, receive and review proposals relative to means by which the University might increase the distinctiveness of its approach to undergraduate education. The screening committee shall report to the Faculty Senate on February 10, 1983.

The membership shall be comprised of four faculty members appointed by the Faculty Senate, two administrators appointed by the President and one undergraduate student appointed by the Student Senate.
