Annual Report of the Research Policy and Facilities Committee (REPOFAC)

1. Copyright. On February 13, 1986, the Faculty Senate approved the addition of the following new section 10.45.11 of the University Manual which was recommended by REPOFAC on November 21, 1985:

10.45.11 Copyrights. Notwithstanding any language contained in 10.40.10 - 10.45.10 to the contrary, the copyright of all textbooks and scholarly works, including those of pictorial art and music, but excluding computer software other than that produced outside the line of University duty and on the creator's/ creators' own time and without the use of University facilities, shall be the property of the creator(s). Works specifically commissioned by or through the University, however, will not be covered by this section but shall be subject to the applicable provisions of 10.40.10 - 10.45.10.

This section replaces sections 10.51.10 and 10.51.11.

This policy was approved by President E.D. Eddy and forwarded to the Board of Governors for Higher Education on March 6, 1986. It was subsequently approved by this body. The development, presentation, and approval of this policy dominated REPOFAC activities during the year.

2. A Proposal for the Establishment of a Vice Presidency for Research. The committee discussed this issue at length with Dr. Thomas R. Pezzulo. The main topic of discussion centered on the duties and responsibilities this individual would have to the University Scientific Community. The funding of this office was also discussed. During these discussions, several members of the REPOFAC committee voiced their displeasure with Research Grant Accounting and Purchasing. They hoped that the new Vice President would play a significant role in straightening out the problems and policies which seem to plague these offices. The REPOFAC committee endorsed, in principle, the creation of a Vice President for Research.
