

CURRICULAR REPORT FROM THE GRADUATE COUNCIL TO THE FACULTY SENATE  
REPORT NO. 1988-89-2

At its Meeting No. 270 held on November 18, 1988 the Graduate Council considered and approved the following curricular matters which are now submitted to the Faculty Senate for information and confirmation as indicated.

I. Matters of Information.

A. College of Human Science and Services

1. Department of Communicative Disorders

- a. Extension of time limit to Spring 1989 for offering CMD 582X

CMD 582X Motor Speech Disorders II,3  
Diagnosis and management of apraxia of speech and dysarthrias. Aspects of neuroanatomy relevant to the production of speech. Etiologies of motor speech disorders including neuromotor diseases, stroke, and trauma. (Lec 3) Pre: Admission to graduate program in CMD; 372 or equivalent. Staff

B. College of Arts and Sciences

1. Library and Information Studies

- a. Temporary Course

LRS 535X Public Library Services to Children and Young Adults II,3  
Public library services to children and young adults, with emphasis on the development of programs to meet library goals and objectives. (Lec 3) Pre: LSC 502 or permission of instructor. Eaton

II. Matters Requiring Confirmation by the Faculty Senate.

A. College of Pharmacy

1. Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology

- a. Add (new)

PCL 642 Biochemical Toxicology II,3  
Biochemical and molecular aspects of chemically-induced cell injury and chemical carcinogenesis. (Lec 3) Pre: BCP 581, 582 and 441, 442 or permission of department. In alternate years, next offered Spring 1989. Babson.

B. College of Human Science and Services

1. Dept. of Physical Education, Health & Rec.

- a. Addition of International Sport and Physical Education as a specialization in the M.S. degree program.

Core Courses Required: PED 510; PED 530; PED 578 or 582; PED 559 or 562 or 585; PED/HLT 591 or PED/HLT 599 (total 15-18 credits). In addition twelve to eighteen credits from the following courses, of which PED 525, PED 526, PED 592, REN 595 or PSC 431 are required courses, and PED 560, RCR 485. As part of the

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program all students will complete a minimum of 180 hours of field experience in an approved international agency setting and under the supervision of a department faculty member. Through an agreement between the Department of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance and the Institute for International Sport, the student internship may be arranged through the Institute's Sports Corps Internship program. It is highly recommended that the student complete PED 591: Special Problems concurrent with the field placement and that the special problems project be applicable to his/her internship placement.

b. New Courses

PED 525 Comparative Physical Education and Sport I or II,3  
Examination of the status and practice of sport and physical education in selected countries. Emphasis is placed on comparative analyses in developed and third world countries. (Lec 3) Pre: Graduate standing or permission of instructor. Polidoro

PED 526 Sport and International Relations I or II,3  
An examination of the role that sport plays in promoting international relations. Special lectures, readings, library research on topics relating to sport and international relations. (Lec 3) Pre: Graduate standing or permission of instructor. Polidoro

PED 592 (or HLT 592 or RCR 592) Internship in Physical Education I,II,SS,3  
Directed field experience under the supervision of a faculty member and a professional staff member of the cooperating institution. Application of knowledge, synthesis of practical experiences. Paper required. Pre: A minimum of 12 graduate credits plus permission of major professor and department chair. Staff

C. College of Engineering

1. Department of Industrial and Manufacturing Engr.  
a. Changes

IME/MCE 549 Advanced Product Design for Manufacturability-  
title, description, and prerequisite changed to:

IME/MCE 549 Advanced Product Design for Manufacture I,3  
Techniques for analyzing product structures for ease of assembly and manufacture. Considers mechanical and electronic products and choice of materials and processes. A design project and term paper are required. (Lec 3) Pre: IME 240 or IME 340 and IME 444 or current registration. Not for graduate credit for students who have taken IME/MCE 449. Dewhurst/Boothroyd
