CMD 571X Medical Speech-Language Pathology I and II,1
This course prepares students to work in medical speech pathology settings. It deals with scope of practice, coordination, and prioritizing of speech pathology services in medical settings requiring interdisciplinary teamwork. (Lec 1) Pre: Students should be enrolled in CMD 570 and participating in hospital placement.

Program Requirements: **Delete** "including two 600-level seminars" (delete both references). **Change** for specialization in rhetoric and composition "WRT 512, 535 and ENG 680, 681" to "ENG 512, 520 and 645."

Ph.D. in English

Admission Requirements: **Change** "3.30" to "3.50."

Program Requirements: **Delete** "(including a minimum of four 600-level courses)." **Change** (for the specialization in rhetoric and composition studies) "WRT 512, 535 and ENG 680, 681" to "WRT 512, 520 and 645."

Add: (under **Financial Aid**)

In addition to teaching assistantships, there "are diversity assistantships and" editorial...

Change: "ATQ: American Transcendental Quarterly" to "ATQ: A Journal of 19th Century American Literature and Culture." Add: "priority will be given to "Ph.D." applications.

1. Department of Natural Resources Science

a. Changes in M.S. in Natural Resources program requirements to read:

Program requirements: for thesis option, thesis and 24 course credits, including at least 1 credit in NRS 500. For nonthesis option, permission of chairperson, 36 credits with a minimum of 14 credits in Natural Resources Science to include 3 credits in NRS 591 or 592 and at least 1 credit in NRS 500, three credits in statistics, and a written Master's examination. NRS 591 or 592 will require a substantial paper involving significant independent research. Additional prerequisite courses in the basic sciences may be required prior to admission to a degree program.

NRS 500 Graduate Seminar in Natural Resources - prerequisite changed to: Graduate standing in NRS. Enrollment is required of all graduate students in residence, but no more than 2 credits may be taken for program credit
