

**Faculty Senate Curricular Affairs Committee
Four Hundred Seventy-Eighth Report**

At the March 29, 2010 meeting of the Curricular Affairs Committee the following matters were considered and are now presented to the Faculty Senate.

**SECTION I
Informational Matters**

A. College of Arts and Sciences

1. Department of Art and Art History

CHANGE: Title for ARH 354 to "Art of the Ancient Mediterranean" and prerequisite to "251 or 252 or permission of instructor. May be repeated once with permission of instructor."

2. Department of Sociology and Anthropology

CHANGE: Prerequisite to "Pre: SOC major, junior or senior standing or permission of instructor" for the following courses:

- 1) SOC 330**
- 2) SOC 331**
- 3) SOC 370**

B. College of Business Administration

CHANGE: Prerequisite for BUS 355 to "Pre: 110 or CSC 101, BUS 210 or STA 308, and junior standing in a degree-granting college or permission of instructor."

C. College of the Environment and Life Sciences

Department of Nutrition and Food Sciences

CHANGE: Effective date to Fall 2012 (from Fall 2010) for approved prerequisite changes for NFS 276, NFS 360, NFS 375 and NFS 440

D. College of the Engineering

1. Department of Chemical Engineering

CHANGE: Prerequisite for the following courses:

- 1) CHE 212 to "Pre: CHM 112 or 192 or permission of Instructor."**
- 2) CHE 272 to "PRE: 212 and credit or concurrent enrollment in MTH 243 or permission of instructor."**
- 3) CHE 313 to "Pre: 212 or CHM 431 and MTH 243 or concurrent enrollment in MTH 243 or permission from instructor."**

- 4) CHE 314 to "Pre: 313 or permission of instructor."
- 5) CHE 328 to "Pre: 348 or permission of instructor."
- 6) CHE 332 to "Pre: CHM 101, 103, or 191, or permission of instructor."
- 7) CHE 345 to "348 or permission of instructor."
- 8) CHE 346 to "Pre: 348 or permission of instructor."

SECTION II

Curricular Matters which Require Confirmation by the Faculty Senate

A. College of Arts and Sciences

1. Department of Sociology and Anthropology

CHANGE: Catalog description for the B. S. degree in Sociology, Criminology and Criminal Justice option to read as follows:

Criminology and Criminal Justice Option. A minimum of 30 credits is required including SOC 100, 230, 274, 301, 370, and 476 (18); two courses selected from SOC 240, 242, 336, 375, 403, 413, 428, and 452 (6); and two courses selected from SOC 300, 330, 331, 420, 497, 498, and 499 (6). SOC 300, SOC 497, SOC 498 and SOC 499 may be used only when the subject matter is central to criminology and/or criminal justice; students should consult with the program coordinator before enrolling in one to ensure the course can be used for the major. No more than 3 credits in independent study and/or field experience may be used toward the 30 credits required for the major. Students in this major must fulfill the foreign language/cross-cultural competence requirement by demonstrating competence in a foreign language, taking 6 credits in a foreign language, or by study abroad in an approved academic program for at least one semester. They may not use cross-cultural competence courses to fulfill this requirement. In addition to the required courses, students selecting this option are strongly encouraged to take PSC 288 and PSC 472.

B. College of Business Administration

CHANGE: Description of curriculum for B.S. degree majors as follows:

- a. Add Entrepreneurial Management to the list of majors that require BUS 211 in the sophomore year.
- b. Add BUS 390 to the junior year for the following majors:
 - 1) Accounting
Junior Year First semester: 16 credits
BUS 301 (3), 320 (3), 341 (3), 390 (1), 401 (3), and one liberal elective (3).
 - 2) Entrepreneurial Management
Junior Year First Semester: 16 credits
BUS 315 (3), 341(3), 345 (3), 365 (3), 390 (1), and one liberal elective (3).
 - 3) Finance
Junior Year First semester: 16 credits

BUS 301 (3), 320 (3), 365 (3), 341 (3), 390 (1), and one liberal elective (3).

4) General Business

Junior Year First semester: 16 credits

BUS 320 (3), 3341 (3), 335 (3), 365 (3), 390 (1), and one liberal elective (3).

- c. Change the sequencing of courses for Marketing to include BUS junior year and to remove the specifications on the senior year liberal elective:

Marketing

Junior Year First Semester: 16 credits

BUS 315 (3), 355 (3), 365 (3), 366 (3), 390 (1), and one liberal elective (3).

Second Semester: 15 credits

BUS 320 (3), 341 (3), 345 (3), 367 (3), and one liberal elective (3).

Senior Year First Semester: 15 credits

BUS 441 (3), 460 (3), 465 (3), 468 (3), and one liberal electives (3).

Second Semester: 15 credits

BUS 445 [capstone] (3), 467 (3), 470 (3), and two liberal electives {6}.

- d. Change the sequencing of courses for Supply Chain Management and include BUS 390 in junior year

Supply Chain Management

Junior Year First Semester: 16 credits

BUS 315 (3), 341 (3), 355 (3), 360 (3), 390 (1) and one liberal elective (3).

Junior Year Second Semester: 15 credits

BUS 320 (3), 362 (3), 365 (3), 460 (3), and one liberal elective (3).

Senior Year First Semester: 15 credits

BUS 345 (3), 361 (3), 463 (3), 467 (3), and one liberal elective (3).

Senior Year Second Semester: 15 credits

445 [capstone] (3), 462 (3), 464 (3), and two liberal electives (6).

C. College of the Environment and Life Sciences

All Programs

ADD: The following statement to the description of all degree programs:

"CELS students not only need a 2.0 GPA to graduate, but also need a minimum of a 2.0 GPA in their major concentration area (see specific program requirements) to qualify for graduation."

D. College of Human Science and Services

Department of Kinesiology

DELETE: KIN 222 Basic Movements and Gymnastics (1) effective fall 2012 (last taught 2011-12)

CHANGE: Title, description and prerequisite for ISE 451 to read as follows:

ISE 451 Production System Design (3)

Stochastic and deterministic models of inventory systems. Push and pull production control systems. Manufacturing system design, scheduling, material handling and facility layout. (Lec. 3) Pre: 411 or permission of instructor.

b. Department of Ocean Engineering

***1) CHANGE:** Prerequisite for OCE 495 to "Pre: senior standing and permission of instructor."

***2) CHANGE:** Prerequisite for OCE 496 to "Pre: permission of instructor."

3. College of Human Science and Services

****Department of Communicative Disorders**

CHANGE: Prerequisite for CMD 454 and CMD 465 by replacing CMD 260 and 261 with CMD 160.

***No action by the Graduate Council. Not for graduate credit.**

**** Editorial correction original prerequisite courses no longer exist.**

B. Curricular Matters Which Require Confirmation by the Faculty Senate

College of Arts and Sciences

a. Department of Journalism

***CHANGE:** Method of instruction for JOR 445 by deleting "(Independent Study)" JOR 445 may be offered as a lecture and laboratory course or as a seminar.

b. Department of Sociology and Anthropology

ADD: APG 415 (or SOC 415) Migration in the Americas (3)
Contemporary trends in migration in the Americas with a focus on migratory flows from Latin America to the United States. Migration theories, unauthorized migration, anti-immigration discourses, inter-migration in Latin America, gender dynamics, transnationalism, refugees and the internally displaced, and immigration policies in the Americas. (Lec. 3) Pre: open only to juniors, seniors and graduate students

***No action by the Graduate Council. Not for graduate credit.**
